Post Falls continues to be part of state reciprocal program

In 2020, the Idaho State Historical Society asked historical groups and museums around the state if they thought their members would be interested in taking part in some sort of reciprocal program, where membership at one place would provide benefits at other locations.

Turns out there was, and a dozen historical organizations, including Post Falls, were part of this new program that allows active members from any of these groups to visit any participating location around the state for free. Members also receive discounts at ISHS-affiliated gift shops, as well as youth and family activities at ISHS sites.

Today, the program is still going and growing stronger. Recent additions have included the Gem County Historical Society in Emmett as well as the Nez Perce Historical Society and Museum in Lewiston.



Our new membership card allows free admission to 11 other museums around the state as well as discounts at certain gift stores and activities.

In our area, Region 1, the participating organizations are ourselves and Museum of North Idaho. This means that active members of the Post Falls Historical Society can visit the Museum in Coeur d'Alene for free. (We offer membership cards you can show off anywhere you visit!)

Even if we don't charge for admission, we like to keep track of where visitors are coming from and if they're part

of any other historical group, so make sure to note this in the guest book.

The ISHS is also discussing ways to encourage more visits to different museums throughout the state, and may create a passport/stamp program that can be collected at all the different participating locations.

Society, city plan to meet in 2024

Having to remain closed for most of our 2023 season due to mold issues wasn't fun for anyone, but there have been some positive benefits from the experience.

One big plus was a closer relationship and improved communication between elected officials, city staff, and historical society members.

Although there's always been great support between both groups, some of the stronger supporters and advocates for local history in the earlier days of the society are no longer around or as active as they once were. This is at the society level and the city level.

Not everyone knows a lot of the society's history too, especially the many months of meetings in

the 2010s that finally resulted in Mayor Larkin and others generously offering the society use of the Chapin building for a museum.

Previously, the city had offered the use of a modular trailer on different parts of the city campus.

When trying to assess the mold situation, society members talked with the city on several occasions about maintenance issues and overall upkeep. We learned that the basement had water problems dating back decades, even before the city acquired the building.

Once the mold was successfully cleaned up, both groups wanted to continue these discussions, including figuring out ways to make sure there weren't further

drainage problems in the future, and any internal or external maintenance problems were addressed quickly.

These discussions are also a good opportunity to look closer at the licensing agreement signed more than a decade ago to see if it needs any fine-tuning.

Society board members Carol Yost, Cindy Mead, Joe Butler, and Kim Brown attended a city council study session in October.

The city also plans to hold quarterly meetings with representatives from the society board, starting in February.

The society is excited about these meetings, since they can be good check-ins for current and future building needs and generally help overall communication.

Idaho Heritage Trust awards grant for gutters

An ongoing maintenance need at the Chapin Building is getting closer to being addressed.

The Idaho Heritage Trust, an organization that provides financial and technical assistance for preserving buildings around the state, recently approved a grant to help pay for repairs to the damaged gutters outside of the 100-year-old building.

Over the years including several heavy snowfalls, at least one of the gutters have become damaged and bent to the point where it no longer function well. This likely has contributed to moisture problems in and around the building.

The grant will provide up to \$1,000 for repairs and improvements but this must be matched.

Society member Kim Brown wrote the grant along with advising the city, since Post Falls owns the building.

The next step is to coordinate with the city and begin the search for a contractor to perform the work. The grant expires at the end of 2026.

When shopping for fine local wine in 2024, be sure to consider Rosemary Manor!

Owners Keelan and Cara Dixon not only have created enjoyable wine but have also produced a special line featuring the historic Chapin Building on the label. The building is the home of the Post Falls Museum.

The Dixons have also have pledged some funds from the sale of this special edition

batch to go to the Post Falls Historical Society.

Keelan Dickson traces his Post Falls roots back five generations. He and Cara named the winery after his grandmother Rosemary Dickson.

He remembers her teaching him how to make cherry wine in the family kitchen.

The couple runs the Rosemary Manor boutique winery and vineyard and has already created several impressive wines, including a Cabernet Sauvignon, a Syrah, a sweet and dry rose, and a Sauvignon Blac.

At the 100-year celebration of the Chapin building this summer, Keelan shared memories growing up here.

He and Cara also invited guests to sample some of its wines or purchase some to bring home. Their wine was also available for purchase at Winterfest.
